A Message from the Chairperson of the Board



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
In the past two years, COVID-19 has brought suffering to people in every corner of the world. Countries have taken drastic measures, including border closures, in an attempt to halt the spread of COVID-19. International and domestic travel was restricted and only available to those meeting strict requirements. Needless to say, the economic fallout caused significant hardships.

Local communities have also had hard times in parts of Asia and Africa, where GCS has been active since 2008. Our Community Development Project in Myanmar has been temporarily paused because of the 2021 Coup d'etat. The resettlement project of Myanmar refugees at the Myanmar-Thailand border has switched to a humanitarian assistance project as urgent support is needed to deliver essential daily and medical necessities. The refugees are still suffering through difficult days, looking forward to eventually returning to their homes.

In the era of COVID-19, online communication has become more frequent with our overseas offices. In December, we had a year-end party with the children of Rwanda via Zoom. As I watched them singing and dancing in the Dream Library and saw their eyes widen due to the magic tricks shown on the screen, I was deeply touched. As a part of the online volunteer activity, young people from Korea, together with youths from Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand (on the Myanmar border), discussed issues in the Greater Mekong Subregion and planned to develop an action plan. We also had online meetings, looking at each other's faces through Messenger, with local staff in the Timor-Leste Office, which we haven't visited for a long time due to COVID-19. The local staff is successfully pursuing the projects left behind as the Korean staff returned home. In Kenya, the Bodaa Salama project, which supports the motorcycle taxi drivers to secure safety and self-reliance through education on traffic safety, human rights, gender equality, and financial planning, gained a lot of attention. As a result, it was recently publicized on television. In Mongolia, we are expanding our project from livestock to a cooperative that links milk production, processing, and sales. With 20 years of experience in livestock, we are also planning livestock farming education to share the knowledge we gained from livestock farmers across the country.

Over the last year, thanks to all who supported and sponsored Global Civic Sharing, we have witnessed revived hope in the Global Village. On behalf of GCS, I would like to express my sincere gratitude to the supporters, companies, foundations, and government agencies, such as KOICA, for their continued support despite these unprecedented times. Global Civic Sharing will continue to be a reliable partner with your support and contributions.



| One Step Closer to Self-Reliance, the Story of Vietnam |

\cdot As the Projects of 2021 Come to an End

GCS Vietnam carried out several community development projects throughout the year in Cao Bang Province, Thai Nguyen Province, Quang Tri Province, and Hanoi, the capital of Vietnam. Our goal was to resolve regional imbalances based on improved access to education for schools in outlying areas. To improve the learning environment in Vietnam, the Vietnam Office renovated a computer classroom in a secondary school and provided equipment to support the vitalization of IT education.

· 2022 Project Plan

Through the continuous and virtuous cycle of repayment of the Livestock Bank, we plan to continue community development projects for the low-income and vulnerable. In addition, in line with the Vietnamese government's national development policy, we plan to reduce the gap between the urban and rural areas and resolve imbalances in access to education.

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2021 was a challenging year due to COVID-19. Fortunately, the Livestock Bank was not significantly affected by the pandemic. However, in July and August, all institutions and businesses were closed as Hanoi entered a strict lockdown. 2021 was a difficult year without precedent. For instance, the computer classroom renovation was completed in July, but the ceremony was held in January 2022. As we got less support due to COVID-19, we had many difficulties in the field. I hope we get through these challenging times and that various programs like Global Volunteers will be resumed.

The Vietnam Office, which has the most extended history in Global Civic Sharing, consistently carries out the Livestock Bank. Although Vietnam is one of the leading countries in Asia and has started to provide aid to neighboring countries, the rural areas are still marginalized due to the urban-rural gap. Therefore, the Vietnam Office will continue to support the community through ongoing projects, including the Livestock Bank. In addition, we will do our best to prevent further educational gaps by establishing libraries and IT facilities for elementary and secondary schools in suburban areas.

GCS Mongolia has been managing the KOICA Strategic Partnership Project (A project to increase the value of livestock production for the inclusive development of the livestock industry in Mongolia (2021-2025) to induce policy changes by visualizing regional differences. This project will improve livestock breeding for small farms in Mongolia, educate local livestock leaders, and improve livestock laws and systems. Ultimately, we want to contribute to an increase in producers' income, expand the influence of producers in the livestock value chain, and create a producer-friendly environment.

Using this opportunity as a stepping stone, in 2022, the Mongolia office will work with the government and various partner organizations with expertise to create synergy and achieve successful outcomes. By utilizing the 20 years of experience of GCS, we will make further efforts to improve the residents' quality of life and move forward toward self-reliance by promoting community development.

A Journey to Self-Reliance, the Story of Timor-Leste

· As the Projects of 2021 Come to an End

The Timor-Leste government declared a state of emergency in March, including the lockdown of the capital and a ban on movement between regions to prevent the spread of COVID-19. It was a year of restrictions and limited exchange. Although there were many difficulties, it was also an incredible opportunity for the GCS Timor-Leste employees and residents to lead projects. The employees visited multiple organizations, such as the Red Cross and the Ministry of Education to find good instructors. As a result, the local community slowly built their hope for self-reliance.

· 2022 Project Plan

We plan to provide residents with education to support the local community and provide loans to 25 households that have completed their education. Residents will learn how to plan and implement those plans for the future of their families through a workshop on Individual Vision from the Livestock Bank. The primary loan recipients will be selected based on the prepared individual vision plan and household monitoring. In addition, we plan to provide civic education necessary for the improvement and growth of governance in the community, such as decision-making, gender, health, and business issues, and strengthen the ability to communicate and cooperate through education.

There were many situations where it was difficult to carry out simple banking services because of the lockdown. No staff from the headquarters could visit, and due to the unstable Internet connection, it wasn't easy to reach HQ. However, the more difficult the situation was, the more desperately we needed the confidence to work together and learn how to overcome it. We visited the local Ministry of Education, the Red Cross, etc., discussed solutions, and found instructors for the residents. It took a long time, but we could do it step by step. There are still many challenges ahead of us in 2022. We ask for your continued interest and support to keep our promises.

Due to the outbreak of COVID-19 and the Myanmar crisis, GCS conducted projects during an incredibly uncertain time. As part of the Gyeonggi-do ODA project, we carried out a 'Village Community Revitalization Project through education for residents in the Ayeyarwaddy Region,' but due to political unrest in Myanmar, we experienced an unprecedented early closure of our project. We hope Myanmar restores peace and stability.

· 2022 Project Plan

Currently, Myanmar is not in a situation where it is possible to proceed with projects. Since local communities are experiencing economic hardship due to COVID-19 and the Myanmar crisis, we are planning humanitarian assistance projects providing emergency relief items, food packages, and basic hygiene kits (masks, hand sanitizer, etc.)

| Reaching the Unreached, the Story of Thailand |

\cdot As the Projects of 2021 Come to an End

Due to the number of issues arising in the border area between Thailand and Myanmar, including refugees that have flowed to the border area following the military coup in Myanmar, the Thailand Office has had a challenging year. Nevertheless, with a community full of passion for self-reliance, we carried out a Prosthetics Program, reconstruction of refugee schools, capacity building for young people, and online workshops for teachers.

· 2022 Project Plan

The Prosthetics Program is seeking an opportunity to proceed with a new task after three years. Through the Center for Prosthetics Program, we hope that we will be able to make further attempts with young people who have received capacity-building education based on technology transfer and technical training. In addition, we plan to support students of refugee schools closed due to COVID-19 so that they can study willingly.

Towards Self-Reliance, the Story of Kenya

· As the Projects of 2021 Come to an End

We started the project with the title of 'Bodaa Salama' to improve the safety of motorcycle taxis, a major social problem in Uasin Gishu County. The project provided driving safety training and supported the purchase of safety gear for the participants. We also conducted gender and human rights sensitivity training and campaigns within the community. Through these activities, we contributed to improving the safety of both Boda drivers and customers and enhanced the resilience of Boda drivers by organizing self-help groups and encouraged saving activities. In addition, we have conducted education and campaigns to motivate PWDs to participate in political activities and elections. Education on sexual violence prevention for elementary students was conducted using booklets and animation.

· 2022 Project Plan

We plan to focus on making a year that stabilizes and activates Self-Help Groups (SHGs) for young Boda drivers. We will also increase the participation of female drivers by raising the awareness of gender and human rights issues. In addition, to guarantee the mobility and education of children with disabilities, we plan to renovate the facilities in a school, provide assistive mobility devices and transportation, and provide education to improve awareness about PWDs. Furthermore, we will reinforce cooperation with local governments and stakeholders to cause changes in policy and the environment in this regard.

The 2021 Bodaa Salama Project was a great success. This can be seen by how the project targets actively participated in the activities. They showed a great desire to change their lives for the better, and they became more conscious about traffic safety and gender and human rights. My expectation for 2022 is that we will be able to produce reliable and dedicated Training of Trainers (TOTs) who will play a leading role in social changes. The ToTs will be able to educate other young Boda operators on matters of traffic safety, human rights, and gender sensitivity. I also look forward to seeing the SHGs become more active and contribute to the members' self-reliance. In the future, I expect them to grow to address social issues in the community and fully participate in activities to improve human rights and gender sensitivity.

In 2021, we executed various projects for marginalized community members. As we proceeded with the projects, we tried to solve the issues of the local community inclusively. 'Bodaa Salama' was designed to ameliorate the Boda drivers' financial situation by helping them develop saving habits, improve safety for the drivers and passengers through training, and increase community sensitivity to gender and human rights. Therefore, we believe that the human rights and the lives of minorities, such as women, children, and PWDs, will be protected, contributing to reducing potential disabilities due to accidents. We will do our best to create more positive changes in the local community by making up for the shortcomings found in the project's first year.

| Taking a Leap Toward Self-Reliance, the Story of Rwanda |

\cdot As the Projects of 2021 Come to an End

We have been implementing the self-resilience project for vulnerable people in the Nyarubaka area since 2015, and the GCS Rwanda Office reached a significant turning point in 2021. The Rwandan staff success-fully executed the project without Korean staff support, and their capabilities have strengthened. Utilizing storage programs, farmers improved the post-harvest management of products. The Farmer Field School was successfully executed in line with each agricultural season. The Nyarubaka Community Development Committee (NCDC) started its operations in the community. In addition, the Dream Library Project was able to resume the literacy program and reading education at the library and at schools due to eased so-cial distancing measures. Library facilities have also been improved, allowing the use of media to enhance teaching and learning.

· 2022 Project Plan

From 2022, in cooperation with KOICA, we will enter the 3rd phase of the Self-Reliance Project for Vulnerable People Based on Civil Empowerment. This project plans to build a cooperative-led cassava processing facility, strengthen the business capabilities of cooperatives, and provide training on smart climate agriculture. In addition, we will implement a pilot project using the mobile savings platform so that SHGs (Self-Help Groups) can continue their savings and loan services, even in pandemic situations. In the meantime, The Dream Library Project will bring a deeper understanding of the world to children, youth volunteers, parents, and the local community members who participate in literacy programs and reading education.

The year 2021 was a good year in general for GCS Rwanda because we have managed to oversee sustainable and self-reliant SHGs after 6 years of direct support through 2 phases. We have seen how the members and the Nyarubaka residents, in general, have improved their level of income and critical thinking skills despite some gaps, mostly due to COVID-19. Based on these observations, I expect more achievements from our stakeholders and beneficiaries. They will enter another self-reliance level, which will sustain their achievements and lives. Thanks to all of our stakeholders, mainly the Rwanda Government, for the close collaboration and support.

Although the future is still unpredictable, we have confidence that our empowered team can move forward. In partnership with KOI-CA, we will implement the 3rd Phase of the Self-Reliance Project for Vulnerable People Based on Civil Empowerment, which will support the community's independence in 2022. The Dream Library Project will be operated in cooperation with the Samsung Dream Scholarship Foundation. The project will promote children's literacy levels, academic understanding, and reading ability. I hope it will add courage and strengthen their ceaseless steps toward creating a better future.

| Education for Self-Reliance, the Story of Ethiopia |

\cdot As the Projects of 2021 Come to an End

Akako Village, located in the hilly region of Ethiopia, is educationally underdeveloped and has a very low pass rate on the national exam for entering secondary school. With HAPO Korea Charity Association, GCS supported 32 students from two elementary schools with after-school classes. Although there were difficulties after a state of emergency was declared due to the civil war and the increased number of COVID-19 cases, the students faithfully and enthusiastically participated in after-school classes.

·2022 Project Plan

Although we are cautious about starting a large-scale project due to political instability and COVID-19, we want to identify the local community's needs and find new project opportunities.

Strategic Partnerships

In 2021, the Strategic Partnership Team, Samsung Life Insurance, and the Life Insurance Social Contribution Committee launched the project 'Creating Safe Schools through Education to Prevent School Violence in Thailand.' In Thailand, 600,000 students experience physical or mental violence every year, which is the second-highest amount globally and draws attention in Thailand as a social problem. We delivered education on preventing school violence and a Taekwondo camp to create a safe learning space for students to eradicate school violence.

Coach Young-Seok Choi, who coached Panipak for over ten years, personally participated in all Taekwondo camps and instructed students to protect themselves and their friends through physical activity and mental training. Though the Taekwondo Camps and education on school violence prevention were conducted online and offline, it was possible to raise awareness of school violence throughout Thailand.


In a survey conducted on school violence in Thailand, 1,115 students, or 73% of the respondents, responded that they had been exposed to violence. Another 15% of students were unaware of behaviors that constituted bullying. In 2022, with Samsung Life Insurance and the Life Insurance Social Contribution Committee, GCS will continue to create a safe, educational environment by providing taekwondo camps, education on school violence prevention, and scholarships for disadvantaged students. In addition, for the sustainable prevention and resolution of school violence, the Ministry of Education and teachers in each region of Thailand will establish an intra-school committee to eradicate school violence using Taekwondo camps.

We will spare no effort to support people of all ages to plan and live a safe life. I hope this project will reduce school violence in Thailand and allow students to learn and respect each other in a secure environment.





A voyage to Self-reliance

Essay of Jaekwang Han, a Member of the Board

Three Unforgettable Memories at GCS

Starting his career as an officer at GCS in 1999 and now as a director, Jae-Kwang Han is currently working as a representative of the PIDA: People's Initiative for Development Alternatives (formerly ODA Watch), an advocacy group. From the moment he met GCS to his abduction in Iraq and his grand exit that earned applause, he brings you three vivid memories from his time at GCS.



I have three unforgettable memories at GCS. The first memory is of a conversation in the conference room of GCS in the summer of 1998. At the time, I was a graduate student and was researching Development NGOs in Korea. During vacation, I visited four organizations, including Korean Food For the Hungry International and GCS (which was in its pre-established state). In the books I read at university, civil society always had a considerable part in international development. However, GCS was the only organization that discussed civil society. Director Hyekyung Kim (current president of the GCS), who I had a conversation with, said, "The vision of the Global Sharing Movement is to eradicate poverty in developing countries and revitalize the civil society." On my way home that day, I thought, 'If I work for a development NGO later, I think I will work here.' In December 1999, I joined GCS.



The second memory is of my business trip to Iraq in 2004. I was dispatched in March 2004 to prepare for the appointment of the Iragi branch manager of GCS. Before long, in the city of Nasiriyah, I was captured and detained for 14 hours by the local militia, 'Mahdi,' which was formed by one of the most powerful political figures in Iraq, Muqtada al-Sadr. When I was brought to the militia headquarters, the first thing I saw was about ten militiamen with guns. The militia leader asked, "What do you do for a living?" While the militiamen pointed the AK-47 straight at me, I said, "NGO employee," He was puzzled and asked another question. "What is an NGO?" I told him about the wheelchairs we provided for PWDs in Irag. Then I became a little fearless and said, "How can you kidnap someone who came to help the vulnerable in your country?" After a short moment of silence, a word from the militia leader came. "I'm sorry. We are confronting the Italian forces besieging the city of Nasiris. I will protect you." It was almost 20 years ago, but the memories are still vivid.

The third is leaving work on my last day at GCS. How can I stay longer in international development and be more professional? It was the question I have had since the mid-2000s after joining GCS. The path I chose was to study. I married that year and had a baby the following year, but I still decided to pursue a doctorate in Korea. On December 31, I turned off the office lights and departed. During my eight years and one month at GCS, I learned a lot. There were limits, frustrations, and wounds. Still, I was proud to leave the organization with applause.

<u>GCS was the foundation on which I was able to</u> <u>grow, and it is still a place where I can open the</u> <u>door and say hello.</u> 'Home' is a bland expression, but there is no other better word. As of 2021, many things need to be overcome, but I hope that GCS will move forward without losing its founding philosophy and remain as it is rather than a large-scale NGO.


